












LGS Financial Model

- Emory Schools are typically revenue generating, but LGS is functionally a cost center
- Doctoral students receive:
 - Tuition scholarship
 - Stipend
 - 100% health insurance subsidy
- Master's students may receive tuition scholarships
- The annual budget of the school for the next academic year is around \$52 million


Lasting Impact of COVID-19

- Incoming 2020 class: 58 Masters and PhD deferred, ~4x the average number
 75% of the deferred enrolled in
 - 75% of the deferred enrolled in subsequent terms
- 14 new student slots for Fall 2021 redirected to extend support for current students, ~20 students
- LGS will need to explore and find creative ways to:
 - restore enrollment to programs that suspended or reduced admission in Fall 2021
 - support students who may take longer to complete their degrees because of pandemic-related disruptions





Mental Health & Wellbeing



Common Issues:

- Burnout
- Feeling overwhelmed/exhausted
- Mental health and wellness decline
- Change in living situations (moving, family/roommates all at home)
- Isolation from loved ones
- Racial injustice and civil unrest in U.S.
- Local and global crises
- No separation between work and personal life
- Financial pressures


